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INTERNATIONAL DAY AGAINST DRUG ABUSE AND ILLICIT TRAFFICKING (IDADAIT)

This report serves to fully inform the Ministry of Education, Head Teachers and School Principals on the school responses based on the 2014 International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking which was held from June 23rd June – June 27, 2014. Schools were informed about the campaign via NSAAC Circular 1/14 dated 05th February 2014 and the Education Gazette Term One. Due to the increase in Sexual Offences in the country in 2014, the local theme was similar to that of the previous year. 2014 is the **final year** that the theme will be used as NSAAC will create a new **THEME FOR IDADAIT in 2015**.

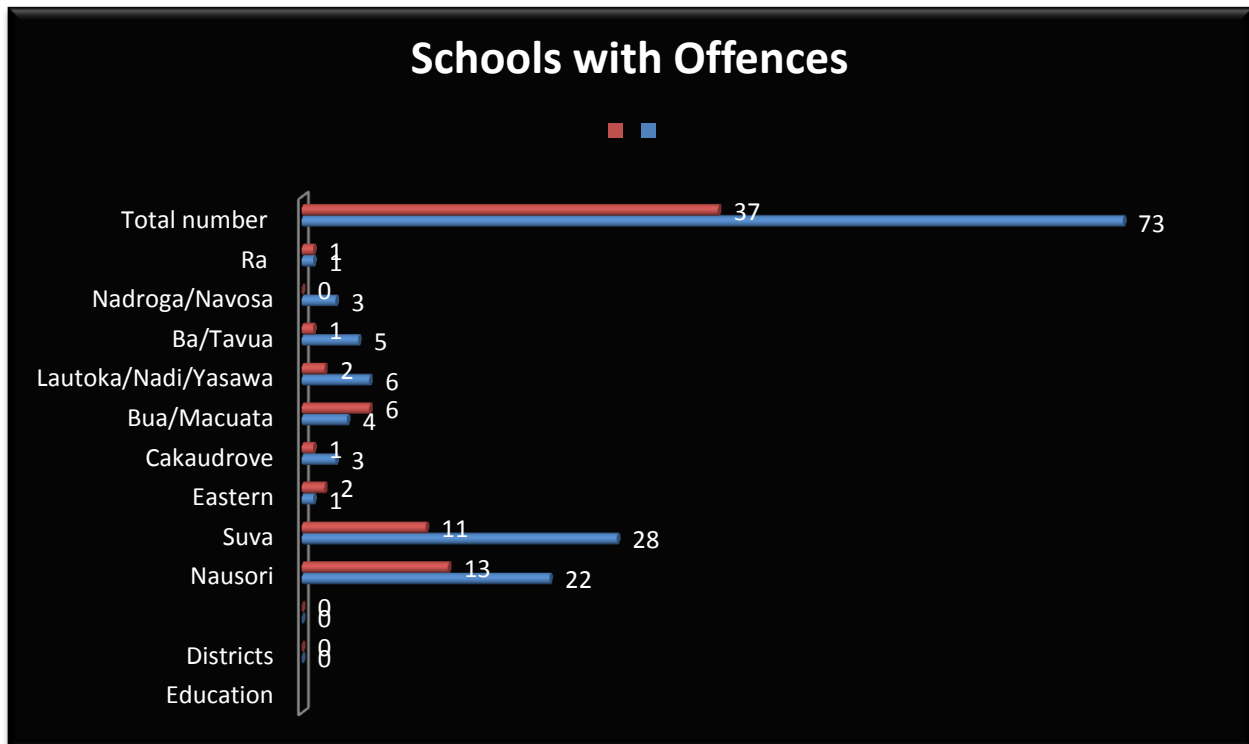

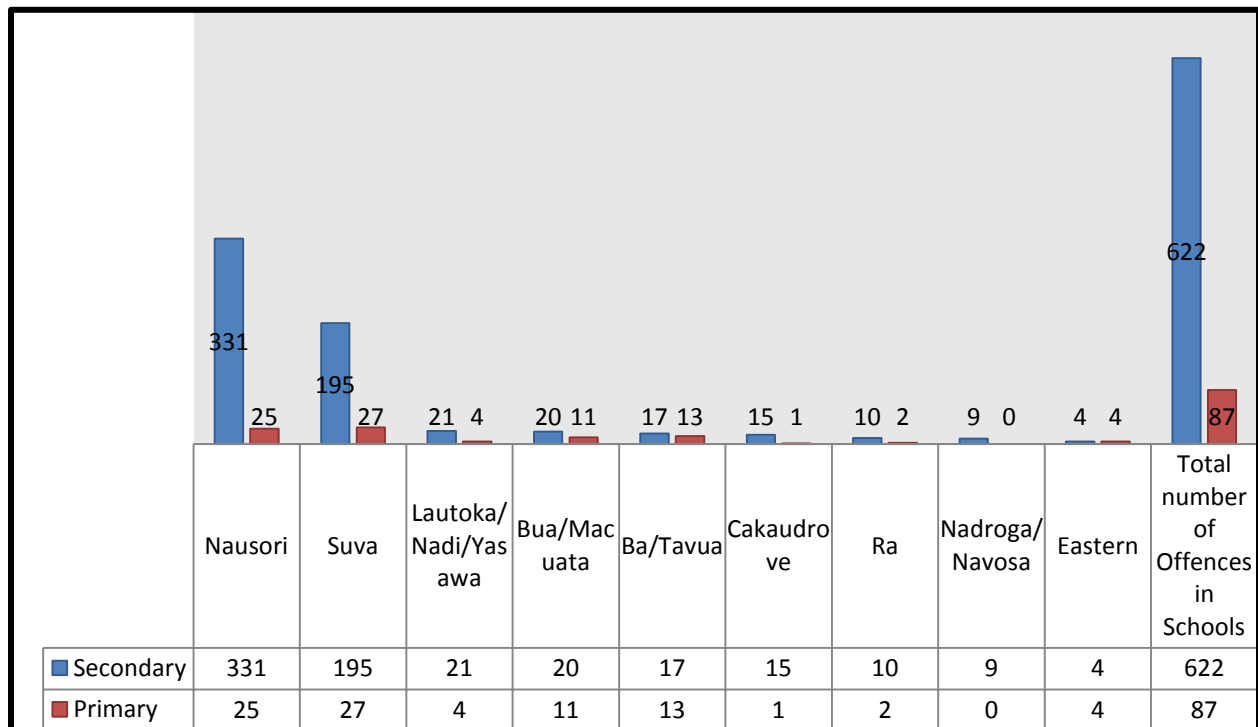

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TOTAL NUMBER OF OFFENCES BY EDUCATION DISTRICTS

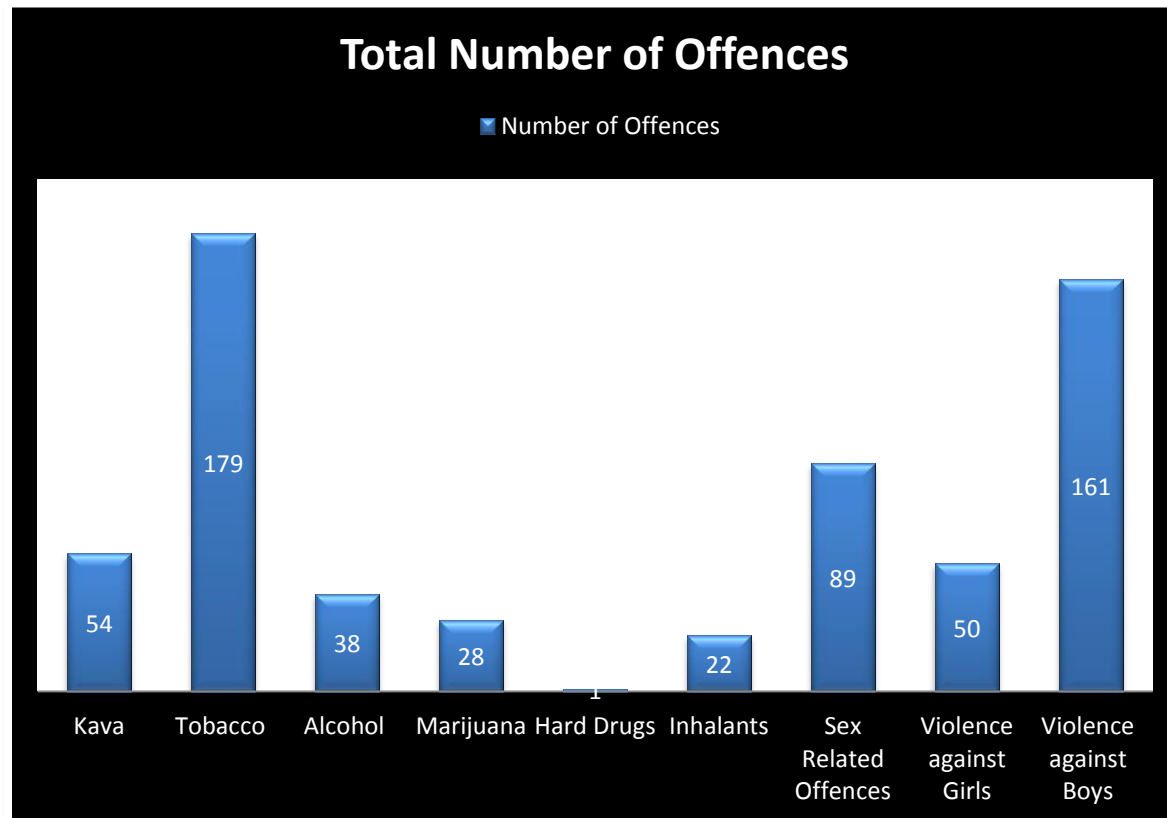

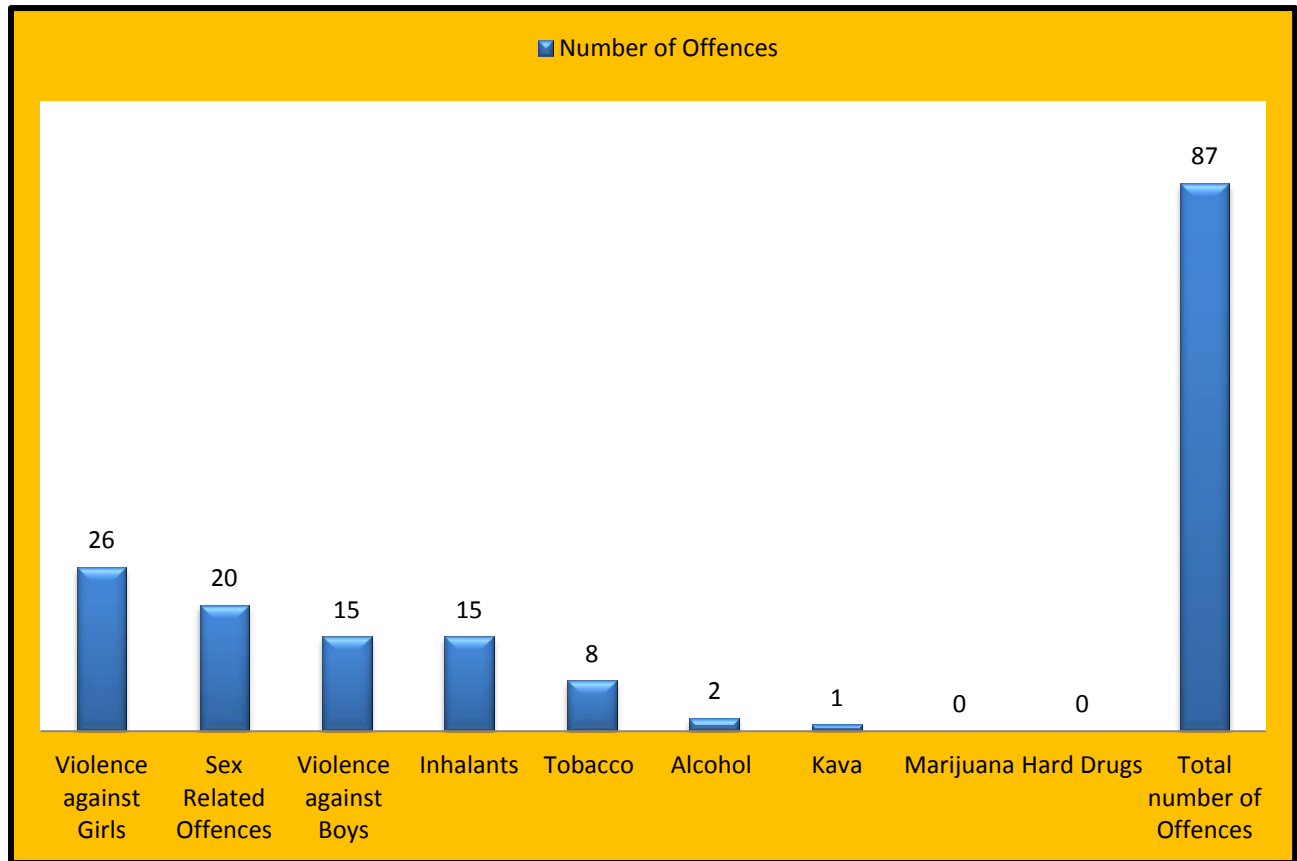

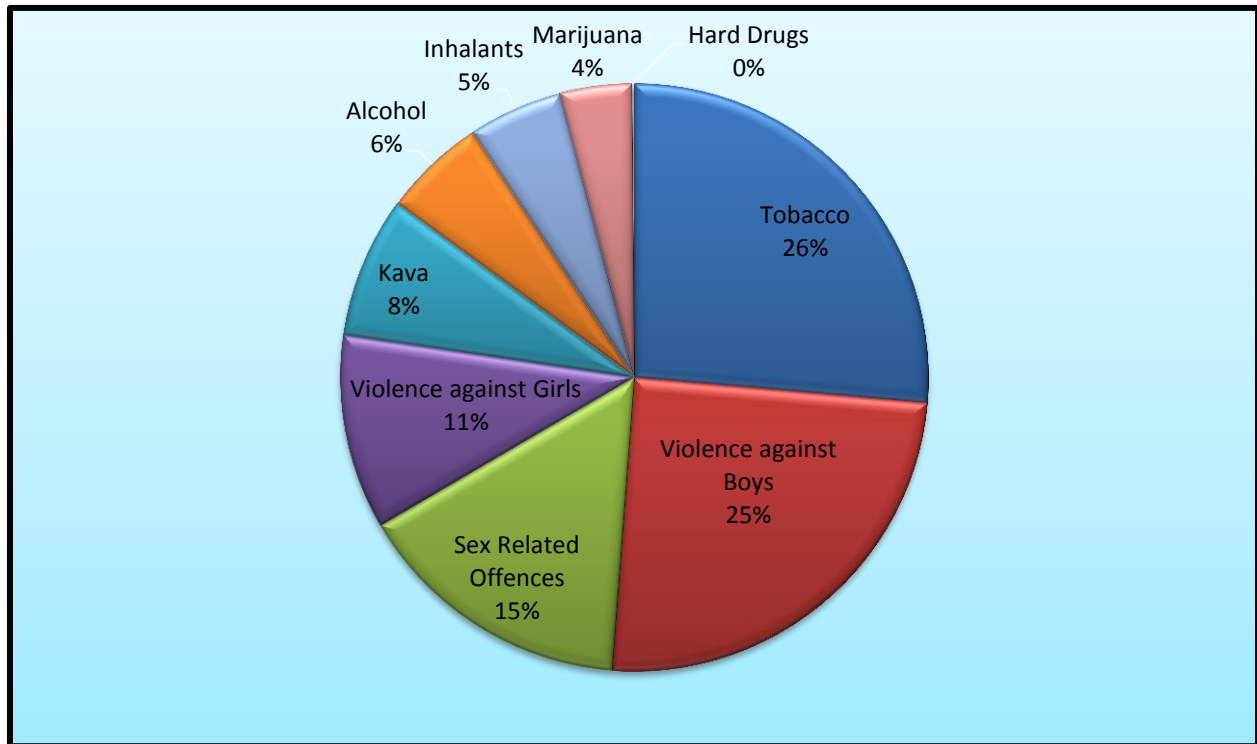

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SUMMARY OF OFFENCES IN ALL SCHOOLS

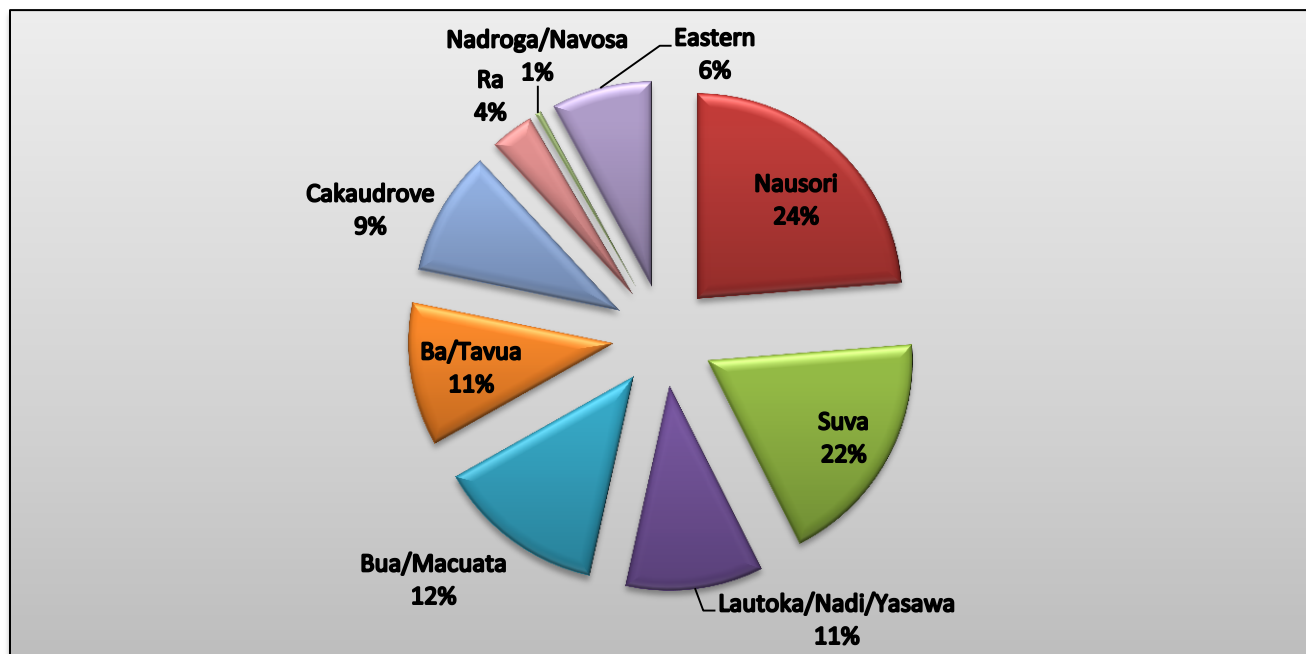

SUMMARY REPORTS OF THE IDADAIT ACTIVITIES FROM SCHOOLS AROUND THE COUNTRY




- 🎉 A very special program was organised on Friday 27th June, 2014 from 1.30pm. A copy of the program is attached. We had a special guest speaker. The Health sister from Ra District Hospital. Children from all year levels presented various forms of items reflecting the theme & the ill effects of drugs on our lives. "No Drug" certificate was awarded to all the students in years 7 & 8 who maintained a clean record for the 2013/2014 period.
- 🎉 From 23rd to 27th June this special program was celebrated. Various Activities were organised for each interviewing day. Monday to Friday where various themes were chosen per day, e.g. "shade/hide from Drugs" & children wore sunglasses. Apart from this, other competitions like poster, bookmarkers, speech poem & quiz were organised. Actual program was on following Monday & the Police & Village nurse were invited.
- 🎉 A school based programme was organised whereby children were allowed to come to school in drug free attire i.e.; they wore head-bands, ties, boots and ribbons. A Drug free march was also held in the school. The station officer was invited to be part of the programme. Competitions such as poster designing and character parade in which all students took part in. Students were also given prizes in all categories.
- 🎉 This was celebrated on 27th June. Children made posters and displayed these outside their classes. Year 803 wrote "Drug Free Fiji" on the railing of their classroom which is visible from the road. A police officer

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from the Kinoya Police Post was invited to Yrs. 7 & 8 to speak on drug offences related activities. We were supposed to have a joint celebration with AOG High at 1pm but that didn't happen.

-  We had our school based programme but we invited the six villages in the Tokatoka District to be part of it. We started off the day with a march involving students, teachers and the villagers. Our Chief Guest was from the Police Dept. and NSAAC.
-  The Programme for the IDADAIT/World No Drugs Day was observed in school on Thursday 26th June 2014. The Programme and a brief report are attached. The chief guest was Mr. Shiu Chand, the Deputy Commanding Officer at the Border Police in Namaka, Nadi. The presence of Mr. Josua Naisele of the NSAAC team was a privilege to our school.
-  The whole of week seven of Term 2 was commemorated as IDADAIT. The students prepared banners & posters to show their opposition to drug abuse & child abuse. On the 26th June, the school organized a one hour programme. The following activities were carried out: March, Drama, Poems, and Movie screening & songs. The police drug teams with sniffer dogs from Nadi were also invited. Teachers wore blue & red clothes & ribbon during the whole week.
-  The whole school awareness day was observed on the 26th June, where guest speakers from Lautoka Police station, Hub center - Lautoka & Counselor from University of Fiji were invited to speak to students on related issues. Some competitions were also organised amongst students the whole week and their work was displayed for everybody to see & read. Please see the report attached for more information.
-  Our school participated and had a whole weeks programme. They were as follows: 1. Guest speakers to talk on: Drug abuse from Namaka Police station and our child abuse from social welfare. 2. Blue ribbon pinning for the school. 3. Inter- form competitions for fight against drug abuse displays. 4. Role plays and songs on Drug abuse.
-  Rotuma High School celebrated International Day against Drugs & Illicit Trafficking on Friday 27/06/14. Dr. Alofa Funaki SDMO Rotuma was Chief Guest. The Chiefs of Rotuma and the School Board Hosted the Visitors. Each form presented an item. The music composed & the school sang the theme song.
-  We celebrated the drug day with the two other neighboring schools (Nasinu District School and Nagigiri SDA Primary school. The OC Savusavu Police Station was our Chief Guest of the day while we had much to learn on that day from the students through drama, poem, speech and the invited guest from the Police Drug Unit Labasa and the Fire Authority Savusavu. The celebration was a successful one. Vinaka
-  Posters & General information related to the theme was placed around the school from 23rd July to 30th July. Organised a march and unveiling of the theme. Invited the Red Cross & Seaqaqa Police representative to deliberate on Violence against Women & children & Drug Abuse and its consequences (See the program attached, organized speeches, poster & drama to convey the message to the students and teachers were Red & Blue ribbon during the week. Years 9-10 also decorated the classroom & created information corner on Drug's information.
-  A grand march was organised with banners and slogans around the school ground. A school poster drawing competition was organised. Classes put on a stage performance to create awareness on the effects of drug. Student made slogans targeting substance/child abuse.
-  A march through Town, banners, posters, drama, speech. The guest speaker was Tavua Police Station Officer Mr. Rajneel Ram.

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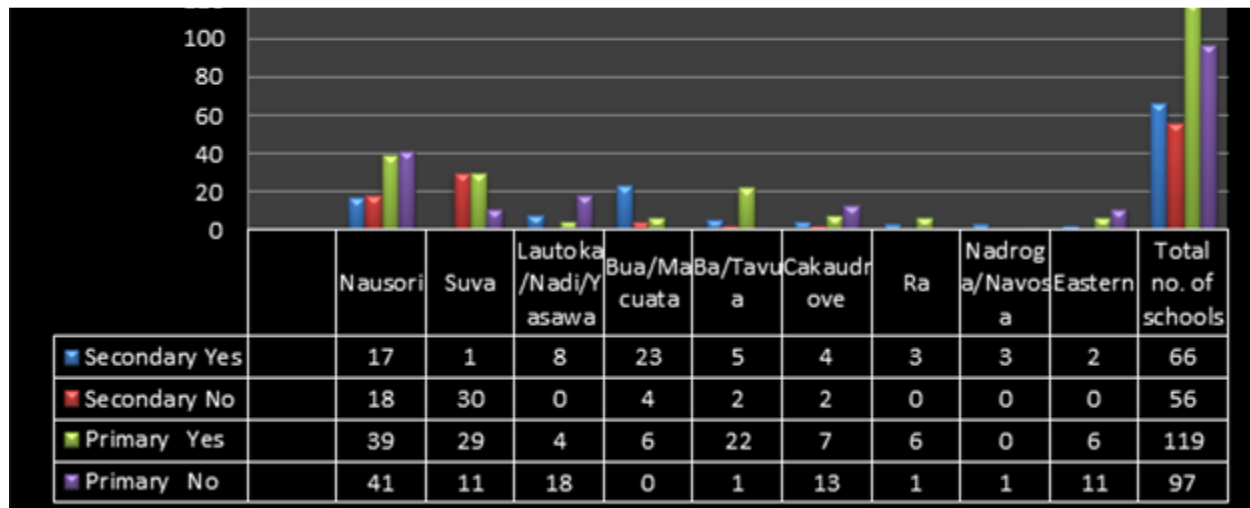
-  The school involved the parents & other stakeholders in commemorating of the 2014 International Day against Drug Abuse. The children marched around the school compound. We invited the church pastor Mr. Nikola Semi to be the chief guest. Children's work displayed at their frontage for the parents to see & each class was to entertain the crowd. We also had Miss Jamie a Peace Corp volunteer who highlighted and emphasized on the effects of taking drugs.
-  The school program began on the 23rd June with the introduction of the theme during our school assembly. A special committee was also appointed to facilitate the running of the programme. All the classes participated in activities which include: Poem, songs, character parade, drama & speeches. Empower Pacific Branch Manager Mrs. Nanise was our chief guest on Friday 27/06/14.
-  During the week, children did research work, postures, and craft work for presentation. The school organised a 1½ hours awareness program on 1st July, 2014 from 1.00pm - 2.30pm. The teachers as facilitators delivered their message on topics such as drugs, tobacco, kava, alcohol, marijuana, inhalants & violence. Drama, Poems and speech was presented by the students. Three Police officers from Labasa Police station also availed themselves and talked to the children on drug abuse. The children artwork was on display for viewing.

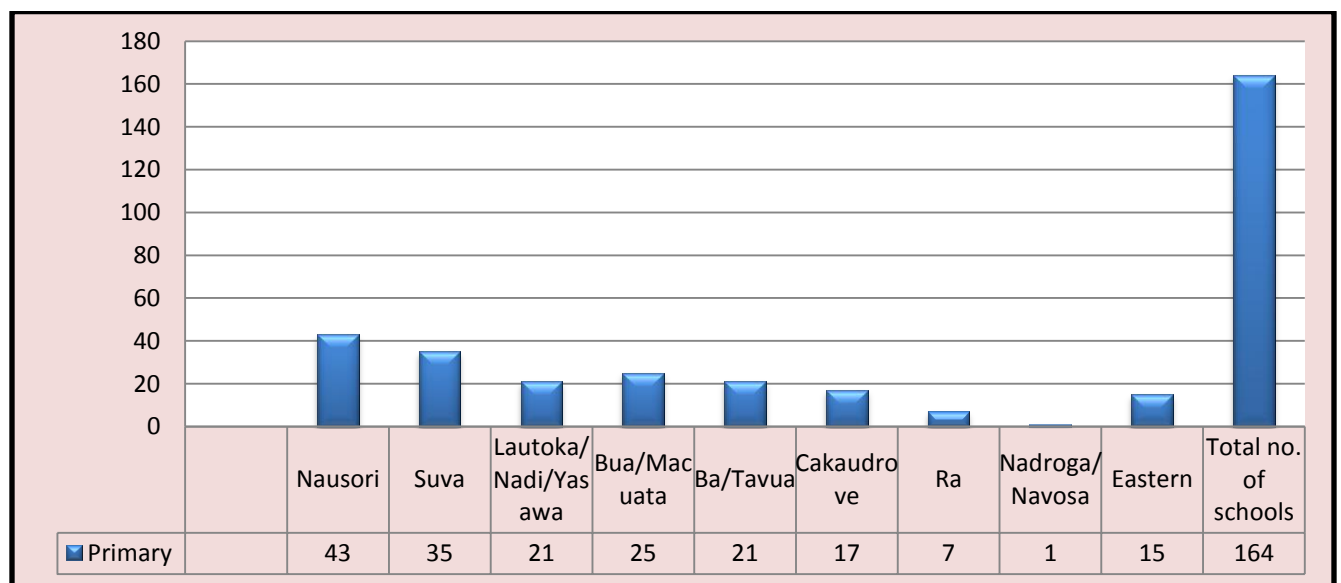
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NUMBER OF SCHOOLS THAT HAVE A DRUG COMMITTEE COORDINATOR

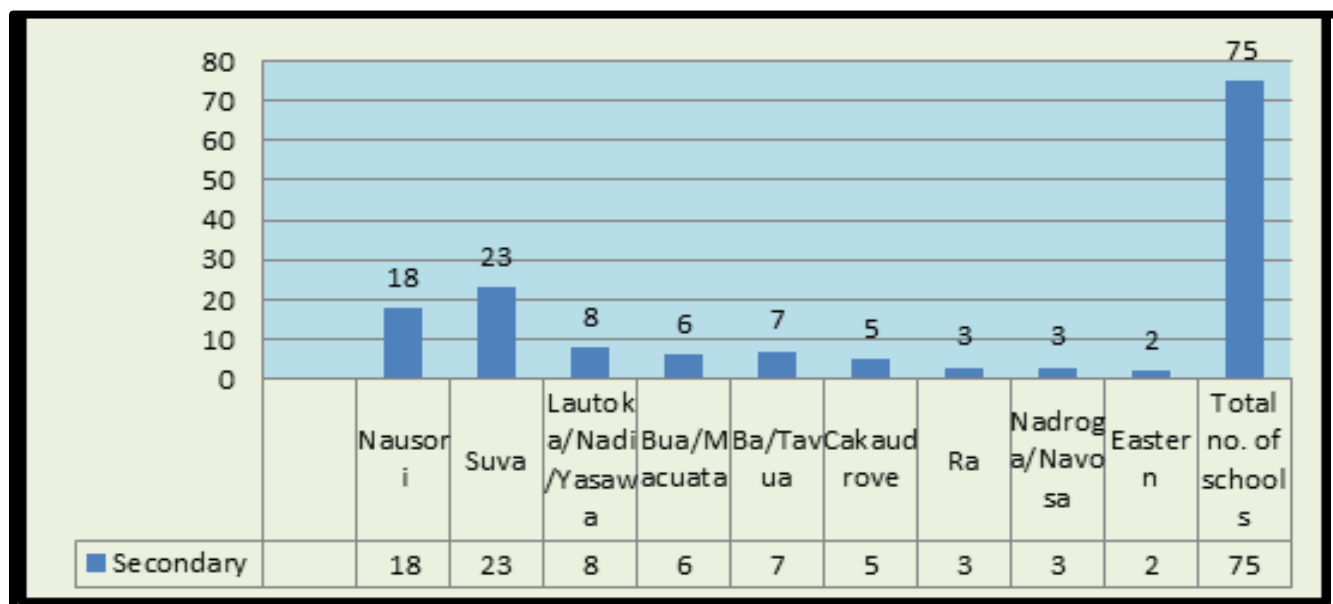

OTHER ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED BY SCHOOLS TO ADDRESS THE DRUG FREE SCHOOL PROGRAM, HIV & AIDS, ELIMINATION OF CHILD ABUSE AND THE ELIMINATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST GIRLS AND WOMEN.

- 
 Conducted 3 Counselling sessions at cluster group levels, assembly based Counselling once a month. Police counseling once per term and children recited. The school "no drugs pledge" in the assembly every Monday. Conducted professional development session for teachers. Child protection policy in place and the right of the girls & the women respected. Conducted one awareness program with the parents during in school Community Awareness Programme.
- 
 Invited our parents to be part of this celebration. They read the posters and listened to the poems and speeches. They watched the drama performed by student. The school compound was drug free for one week. A banner was put up in the school compound regarding the week & its theme.
- 
 In our weekly counseling sessions we always emphasize on the above issues. During our school CAPS we also advise our parents to talk to their children on the above issues. Whenever we have Police officers & Health workers visiting our schools, they also address our children on the above issues.
- 
 CAPS programme relating to the topic on Drug Free School, the teachers conducted Community Awareness Programme during visits. We have counseling every Thursday and Teachers talk on topics like NCD's, Child Abuse and Elimination of violence against Girls & Women.
- 
 All teachers are role models in terms of being free from drugs and substance abuse. Carried out awareness programme for parents, teachers, students and community as a whole. Put up signs of no smoking. Showed videos of HIV and Aids, drugs abuse education video, drugs and alcohol awareness film.

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-  During the past year programme Labour Officer (Nadi) was invited to speak about child labour. In addition Anti-Drugs Unit (Nadi) was called to inform the community about anti-drugs. Outreaches had been made in teacher groups to school communities to inform them of the issues on Drugs, Alcohol, HIV AIDS, NCDs etc.
-  The school celebrated on the 26th of June together with our Kindergarten programme: March with classes in their own themes. Kindy - shade out drugs(children wore sunglasses with their costumes), Year 1 & 2 - boot out drugs(wore boots with their costumes), Year 3 & 4 - Band together against Drugs(wore bandana), Year 5 & 6 - Hide from Drugs(wore camouflage), Year 7 & 8 - Tie down Drugs(wore Ties to school). Colouring Competition & Slogan competition. Chief Guest – Sgt. Epeli Lagi. Boys wore blue shirt & Sulu and girls red skirt & white top.
-  During the drug free programme, the school staged a march along the main road with children carrying placards. This was to raise awareness to the village/community on the above subject. We have been actively doing such awareness from last year.
-  Made an agreement between the committee and staff members who are living in the quarters to have grog only on Fridays & Saturdays. Other days that is Sundays - Thursday - Grog ban. No activities on HIV & AIDs, NCDS child abuse & elimination of violence against girls & women.
-  No smoking zones in the school at Vuanicau Primary School. No smoking zones in teachers residence and also in the village hall.
-  Declared the school to be a Drug Free School and as well as smoke free zone. Emphasized on the importance of Health on the 2nd of April 2014(World Health Day). 31st of May, 2014 We had a seated assembly whereby we discussed the effects of tobacco to our health & children share their ideas about tobacco. 26th of June 2014, Launched a Solove Duavata Community Policing and we are closely working together with them. Any person who come to the school, children & teacher who don't take any of the harmful drugs put their pledge on No Drugs Pledge Tree to swear that they do not consume it. We also made a health corner to promote healthy living in our school and advocating healthy environment to others who come to the school. Organised Monthly seated assembly where emphasize are given on discipline & awareness on drugs, child abuse, etc.
-  Community outreach programmes and meetings held to inform parents on the issue.(CAPS Meeting)
-  Our school participated in the launching of non-communicable diseases week at our own school. We were also part of the MOE roadshow at Tavua town where our students conducted sessions with the NSAAC officers. During our project seminars this year, a medical practioner had sessions with our students on personal hygiene. We also had our school based celebration witnessed by Director Secondary and his Team.
-  A survey was done by teachers on students who are exposed to drugs or are regular drug users. With this survey we were able to select regular drug users and put them into a Drug Free Clubs. Teachers act as facilitators and involved the students into looking at the effects of substance abuse. The students got to discuss issues with their friends and presented it to their peers during presentation time.
-  Hosted the President (HM Ratu Epeli Nailatikau) in his capacity as the Ambassador for HIV- Aids Awareness on 5th February. Hosted Ms. Shamima Ali (Coordinator - Fiji Womens Crisis Centre).
-  His Excellency, the President visited the school. Also invited Doctors and Nurses from Wainikoro Health center to talk to students & teachers. Peace Corps volunteer (Jamie Rosie) was also invited to speak to hostel students. HIV/Aids Video was shown to students at the school. Police officers from Labasa Drug Unit & Wainikoro Community Post also addressed students on drug issues.

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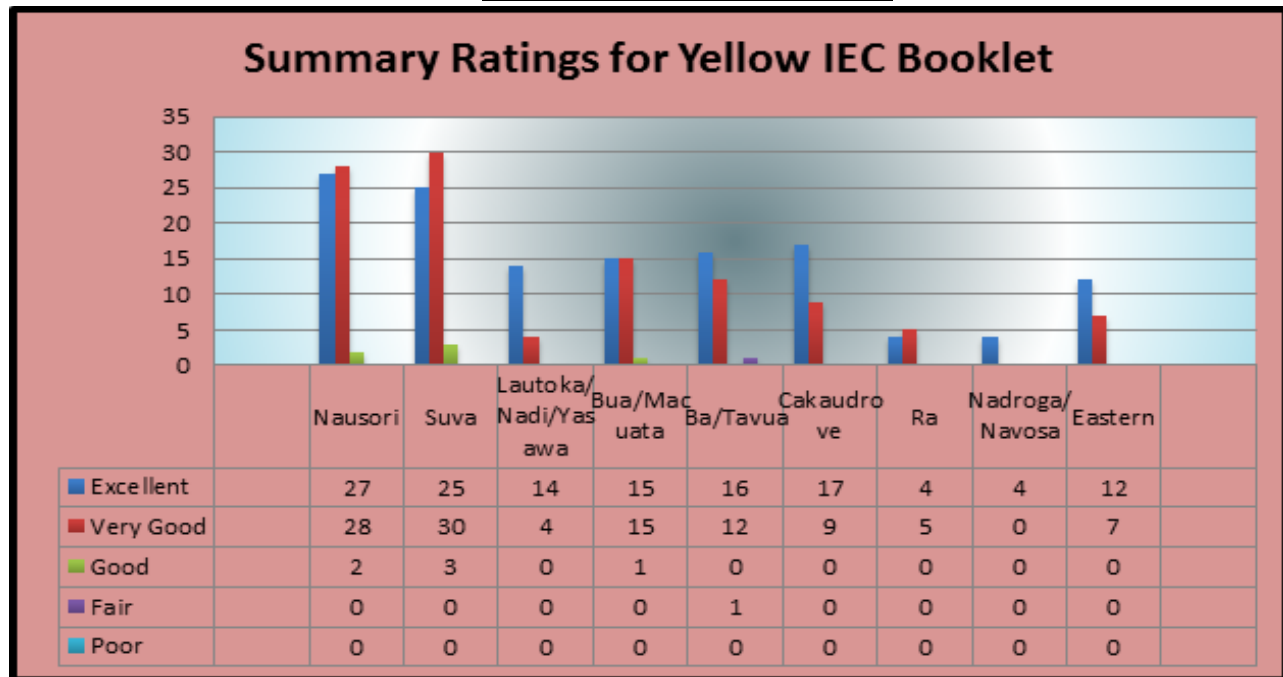
-  The school celebrated the drug day with the two other neighboring schools (Nasinu District School and Nagigi SDA Primary school). -  Viseisei Health Center Reproductive Health Clinic visited the school on the 29/01/14. School Counselor & Peer Educators attended TOT workshop and held P/D for staff members. Student Council Leadership Seminar - week 14 Term 1. Peer Educators Weekly program to students. Participated in NCD, IDADAIT week Outreach program. Continue teaching in Family Life Classes
-  Invited a Guest Speaker from Fiji Police Force to speak on Child Abuse & Violence Against Girls & Women. A Guest speaker from Nadi Hospital (Dietician) to spoke on NCDS. HIV, AIDs during the Drug Awareness Week 7(27th Friday) from 23rd June - 27th June of Term 2 was declared the Drugs Awareness week in the school. Whole school actively participated in the week's programmes. Stop child abuse was also celebrated together with say no to drugs. Various activities were organised to mark the Drug awareness week.
-  The school observed World Anti-Drugs & substance abuse Day on the 26th June, 2014. Active participation by students in Oratory, poster and Drama competition. The whole school was involved. The school also organised presentation by Korovou Police Officers on effects of drugs.
-  Ministry of Health Officials conducted awareness regarding NCDs. The also had community outreach programmes in various localities whereby these issues were highlighted to the parents.
-  The schools conducted counseling sessions with students on the Drug issues. Also it's been integrated in everyday lessons. Since it's an Adventist school it's a smoking, alcohol free zone.
-  This year we have agreed that the consumption of alcohol is prohibited in any school premises. Kava is prohibited for consumption during the week except for Fridays & Saturdays. Counseling is carried out on both boys/girls every fortnight on Friday from 1pm - 2pm.
-  Engaged the Police Drug Unit, Cyber & Sexual Offences teams to conduct awareness program regarding the above issues to the school community as well as parents guardians. These issues are also discussed in various subjects where relevant, example Religious education, Science, Social science, Home Economics.
-  Presentation from Police on drugs and violence against girls and child abuse. Presentation from Health on HIV /AIDS and NCD's. Presentation from Human Rights on Children's Rights & Child Abuse.
-  During the drug free awareness week students wrote sand read out poems on the theme, also Form 6 & 7 students picked out favorite stories and poems on the internet concerning drugs and read it over the school intercom .A poster competition was also organized.
-  Guest speakers from the Social Welfare and Empower Pacific Spoke on Child Abuse and Elimination of Violence against Girls & Women. Counselling conducted during gender meetings & family life programmes.
-  All school building is a non- smoking zone. Medical personnel invited to school to highlight NCD's etc. to children. The officer also briefed & highlighted girls from Year 1 - 8 about sexual abuse. The staff nurse of Wainunu Health Centre – Mrs. Tavaita Dau was our Chief Guest on the 26th of June and she spoke on a Drug Free Society.

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SUMMARY RATINGS FOR THE SUPPLEMENT BOOKLET BY SCHOOLS PER EDUCATION DISTRICTS



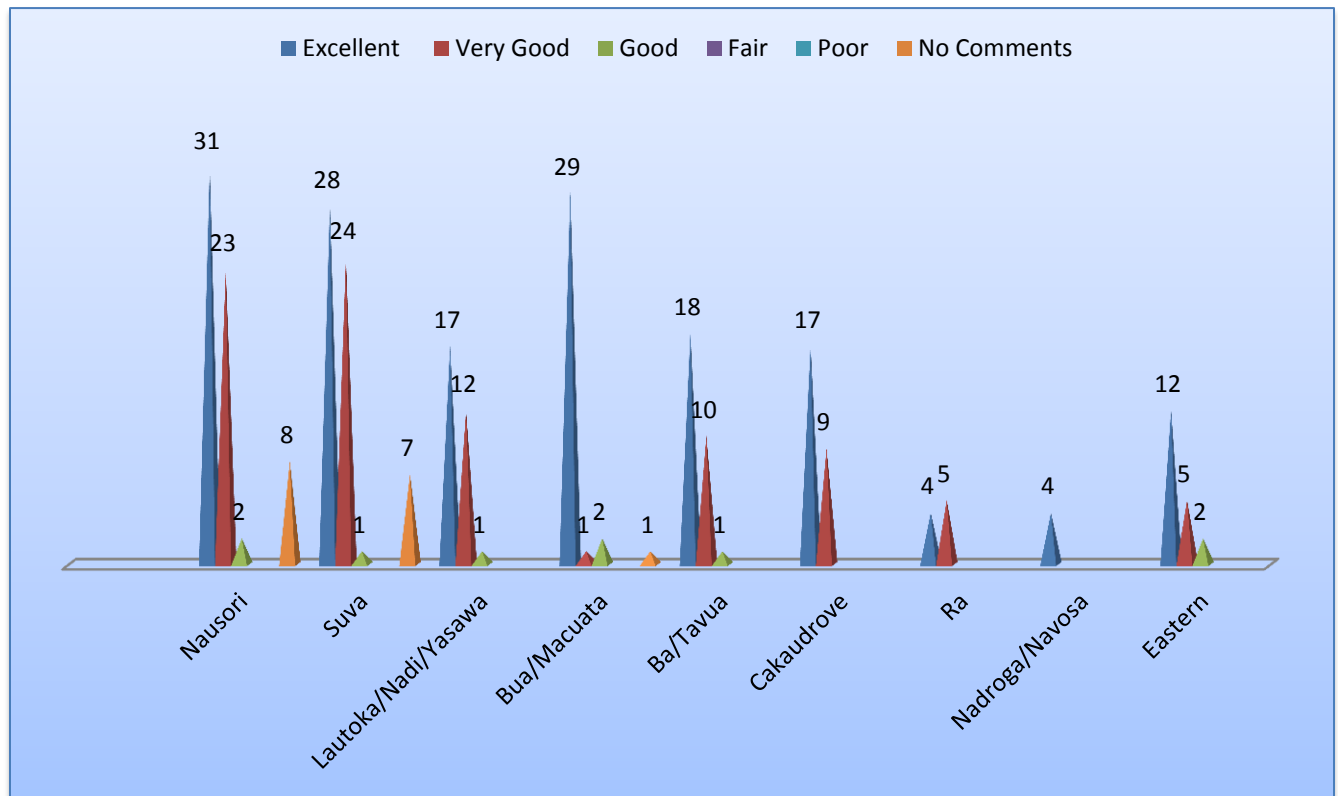
Note: From all the Forms analyzed the majority [42%] of the schools rated the Supplement Booklet as Excellent and 22% rated it as Very good.

RECOMMENDATIONS

-  Please create a website where we can get the guidelines and information for our celebration and awareness.
-  A live program on Television during school hours on 26th June could be an added advantage to create a National awareness.
-  More emphasis should be placed in the school regarding this issue. Children tend to fall more easily when they with their peers without supervision. In towns, more watch zones should be installed where children flocked to every time, since this is where they'll come up with new & dangerous ideas.
-  District based celebrations to be organised and all schools to take part actively & incentives to be given.
-  It would be great advantage if some Professional Development/Training is provided to teachers. Also may be a good idea if district celebration can be organised whereby special displays of drugs can be organised to bring greater awareness in children.
-  Organise workshops for teachers so that school based awareness programmes are organised in a more efficient & effective way. Include Violence against men in this campaign.
-  Essay competition in different categories with zonal quiz competition.
-  The Blue Ribbon Campaign has been quite effective in creating awareness. Some more resource materials (soft copy) would be very influential and effective for awareness programmes.
-  New activities should be included in the booklets. Quiz & oratory competition should be organised.
-  There is a great need to educate the parents. Some parents are just ignorant we need to re-emphasize the importance of their roles in nurturing their children to be drug free. If the home is not well equipped in combating these problems we as stakeholders are fighting a losing battle in trying to stop the above.
-  More activities (new ones) could be included in the activity booklet so that schools can have new activities that can be carried out with children every year rather than repeating the same activities every year. E.g. more video clips incentives for children on presenting good art work etc.
-  Activity sheet, activities to be in different categories.
-  Some form of competition to be organised nationally such as poster competition, poem competition and bookmarks.
-  It would be very much appreciated if the coordinators are given a chance to attend training by NSAAC on drugs substance abuse, HIV & Aids, Non Communicable Diseases & elimination of Violence against girls.
-  Highly recommended that all schools around Fiji plan in advance for the drug week.
-  MOE should liaise with Drug Units within the District so that the officers concerned come to school on any one day of the drug week programme.
-  Story behind the red & blue ribbon provided to all schools. Funds can be given to be used as incentives to children who get prizes for best banners/posters/dramas etc.
-  More awareness in youth groups would be also beneficial as some members of the community are becoming ignorant on these issues.
-  1. Train more teachers to make them take ownership of the campaigns/programs/projects. 2. Supply DVD/VCD/CD aids to help demonstrate some critical & overlooked offences, crimes, laws, etc. 3. Organise workshops for cluster schools to help them plan activities as a bigger group.

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-  Recommendations - if messages and testimonies can be shared or broadcasted over the air or TV so that everyone is aware and are enlightened with the message of NO DRUGS and its effect on training for the coordinators. School visits during the week.
-  Please prepare a National song about the IDADAIT Awareness for Fiji or have a competition.
-  Currently this initiative in our district is school based. I believe we should target the communities as well i.e.: the day he marked on a larger scale by including youth groups.
-  Refresher courses on Drugs, Substance Abuse, HIV & Aids, Child Abuse, Non-Communicable Diseases & Elimination of Violence against Girls & Woman.
-  Community awareness programme on Television and radio talk back show.
-  The school to be provided with more resources and data related to drug abuse/child abuse. Videos/local media to be provided on the impact of drugs/child abuse relevant to Fiji situation.
-  We need to improve our school based celebration. Activities involved need to include illicit trafficking as celebration at school has always been confirmed to drug abuse & blue ribbon campaign if the school could be furnished with data of actual things happening in the country which the community at large need to be aware for. If the school could be furnished with item
-  More public awareness on promoting a Drug Free Fiji. However the TV ads on "Towards a drug free Fiji is highly appreciated. NSAAC workshops for all schools.
-  Change of Theme, organise a district based program so that whole community could participate.
-  Awareness programme should be organised for the public outside school, so that educated parents can also emphasize on what we are trying to teach students.
-  Special request for the NSAAC team to visit our school in 2015 – Sabeto College, Nadi

-  Provide on videos/power point presentations slide on IDADAIT. Have posters on IDADAIT.
-  To have more ads on TV for children to see and actually value the importance of this day. Due to busy schedules if NSAAC can remind schools about the awareness program that needs to be carried out.
-  Financial assistance to schools will definitely increase effectiveness of the awareness as well as more time needed to organise such program will surely create more awareness to communities
-  If school can come in cluster to make the day more meaningful with the support from concerned groups.
-  Solove Primary School is one of the schools that has been advocating & strictly monitoring on drugs in our area. Therefore we humbly request if we could also be informed of any workshop that other school are attending. For the past 3 years this school has never attended any workshop based on this issue. This is in Qamea at Vuanicau Primary School, Togo Qamea (9507140). Arrange for poster competition Fiji Wide to illustrate anything on the year's theme. In age groups. Display outstanding creative works by children using the media, newspaper & TV.
