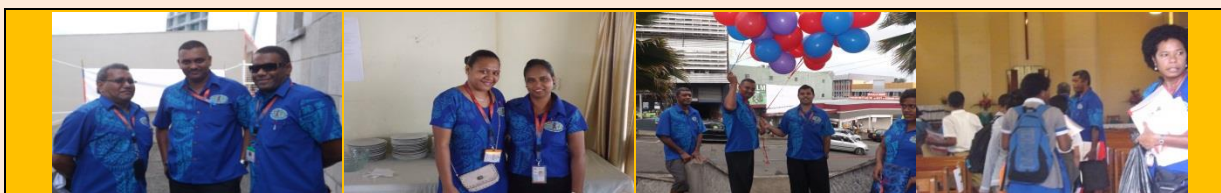

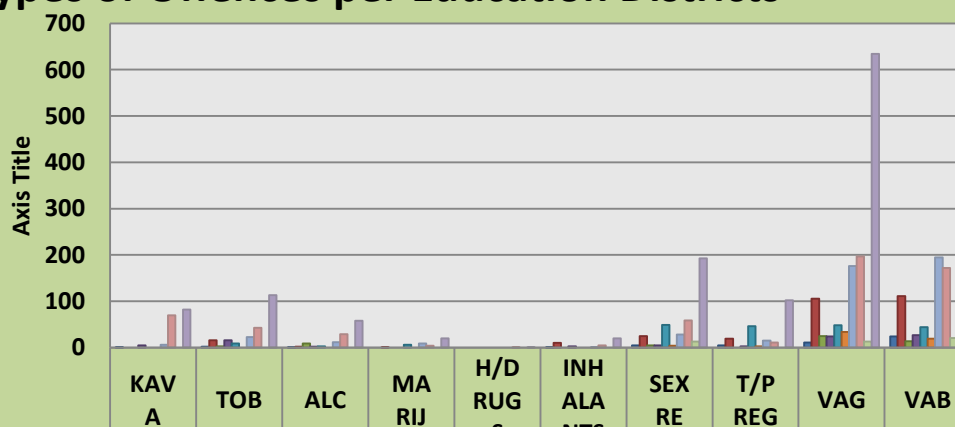

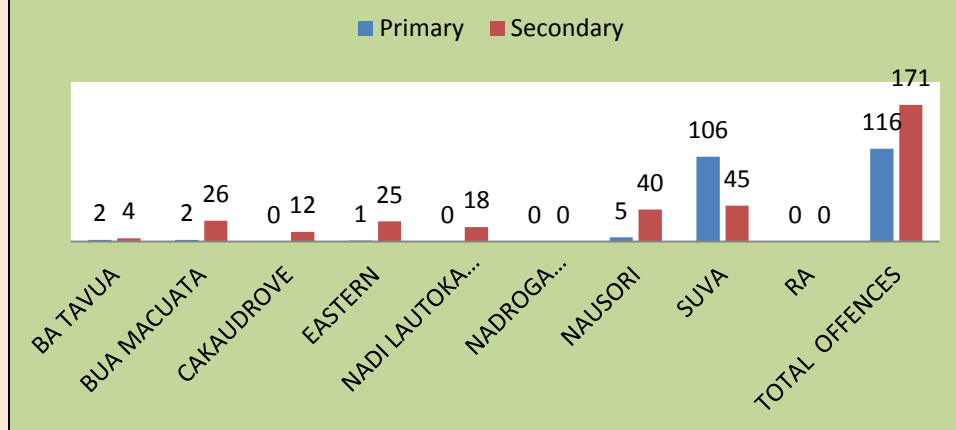

Total number of Drug Cases per Education District

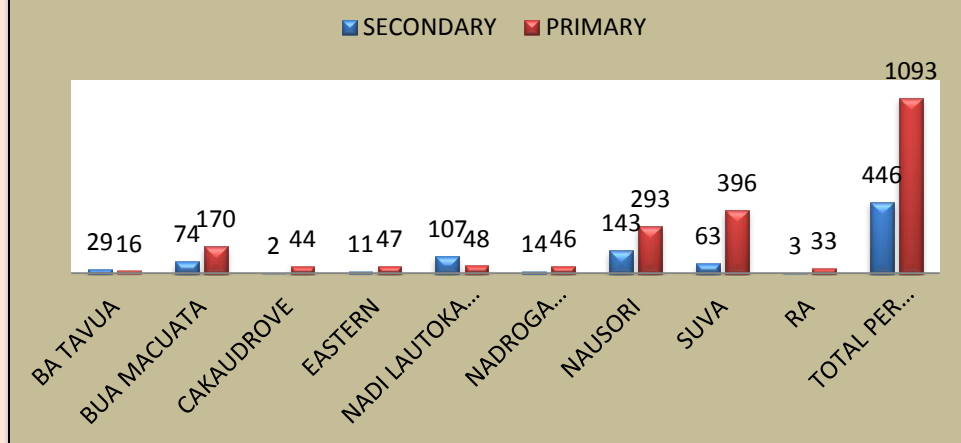

Number of Sexual Offences per Education Districts

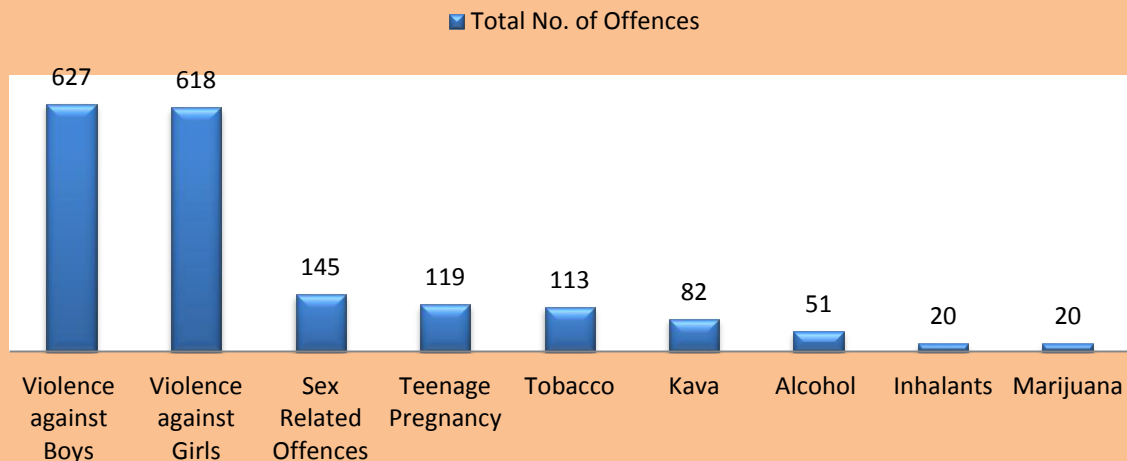

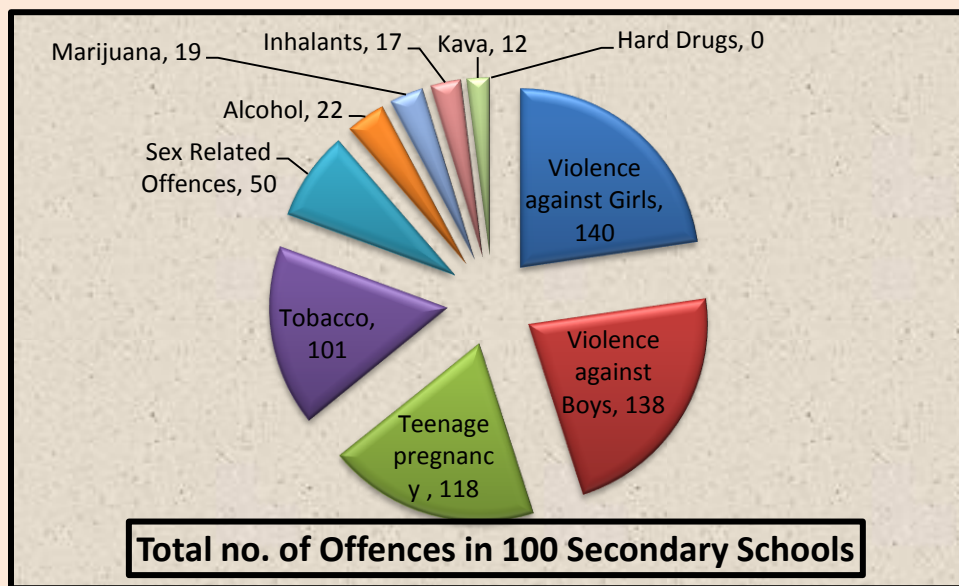
Total number of Offences per Type of Offences

Secondary schools offences - 100 Schools

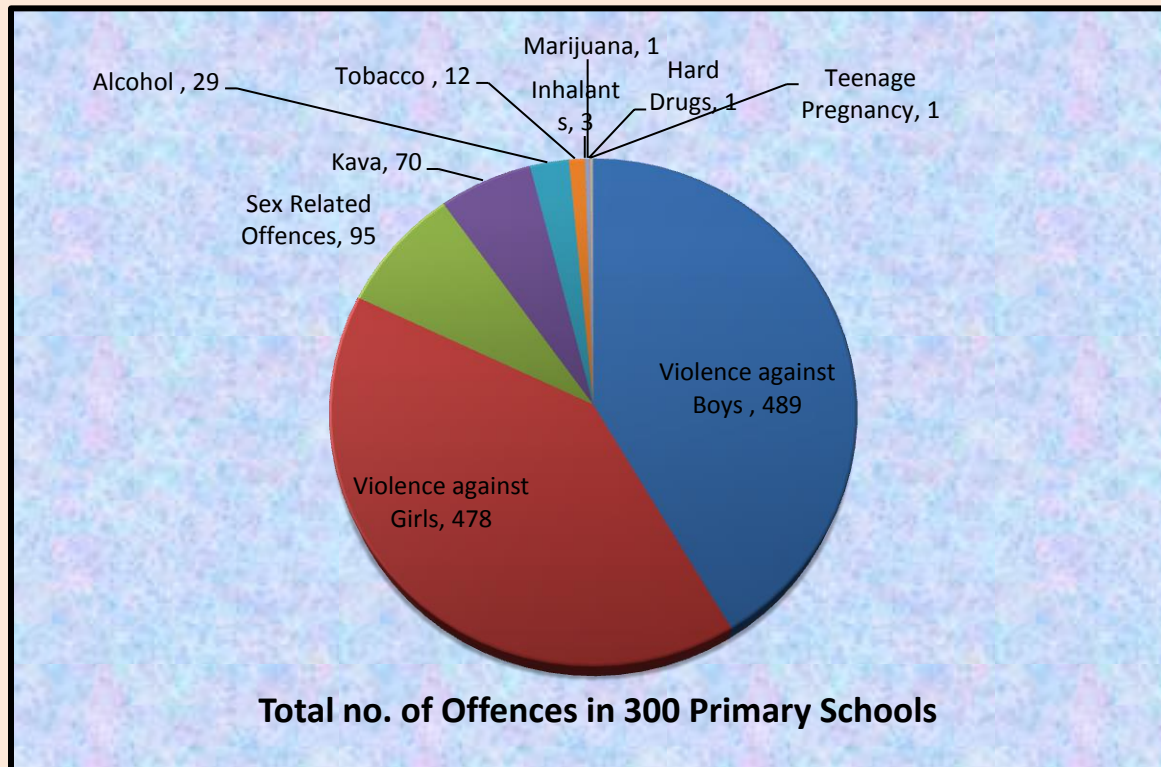

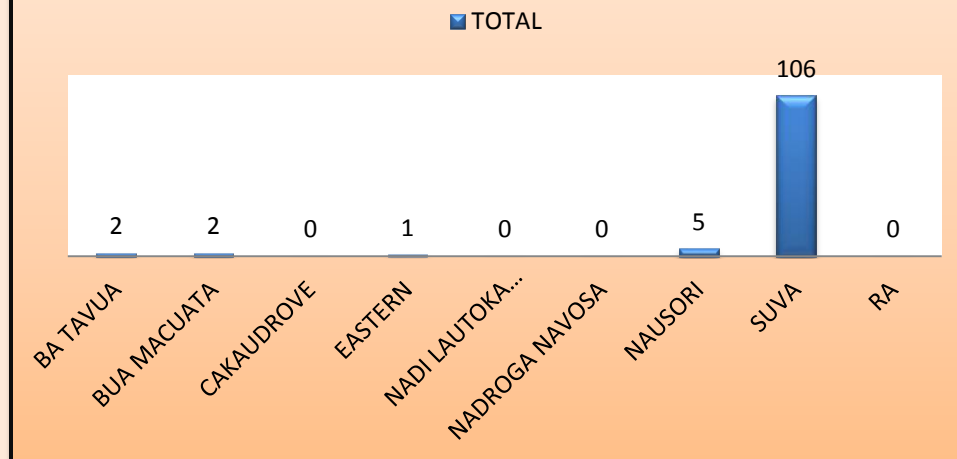

Primary Drug Cases per Education Districts

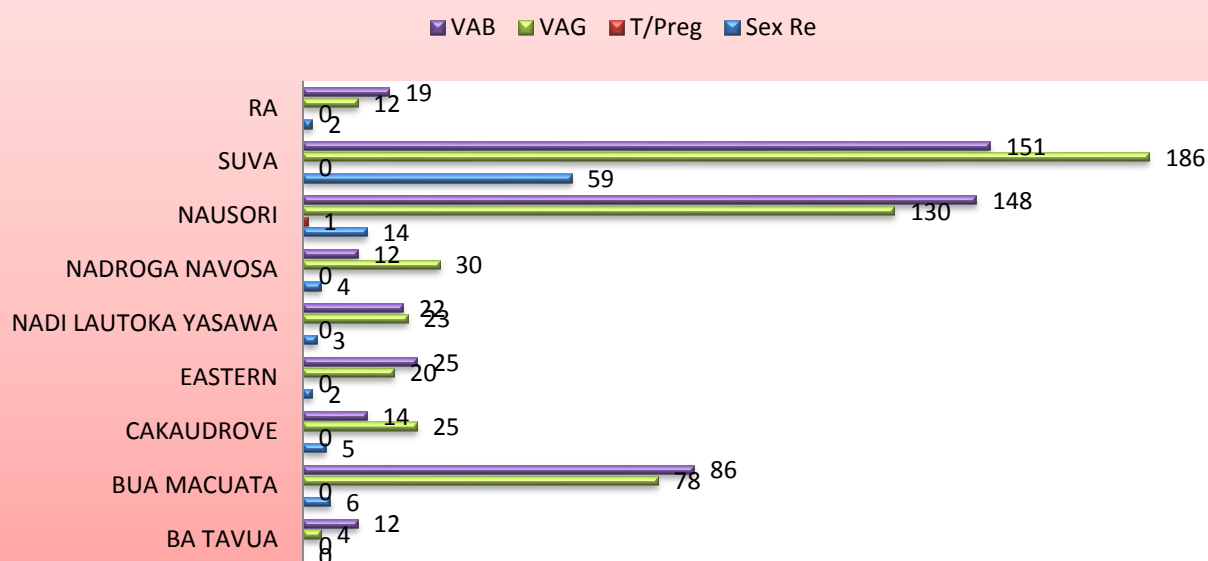

Primary Sexual Offences per Education Districts

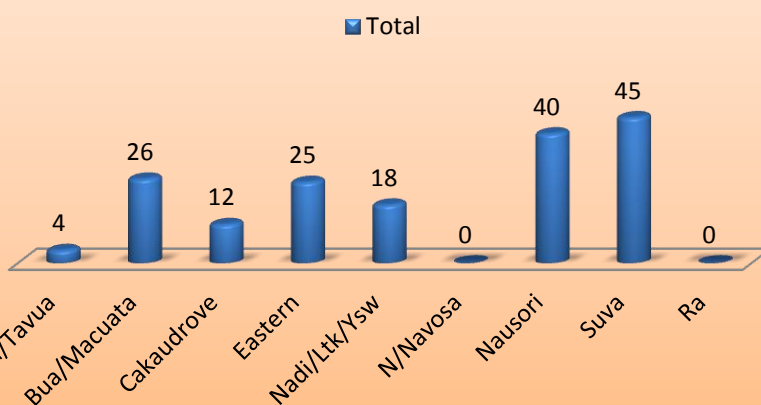

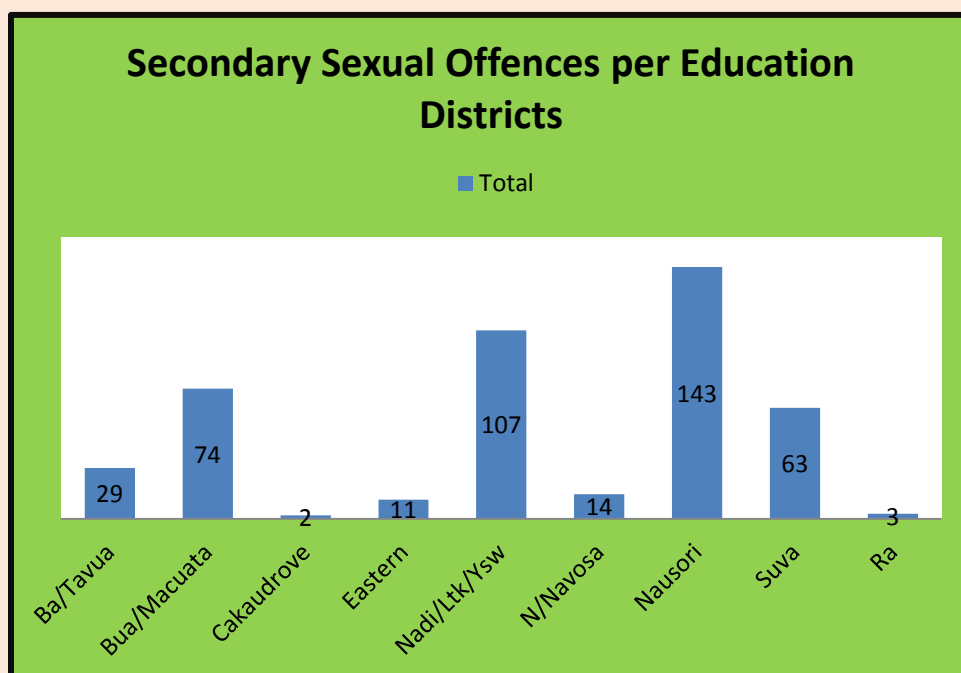

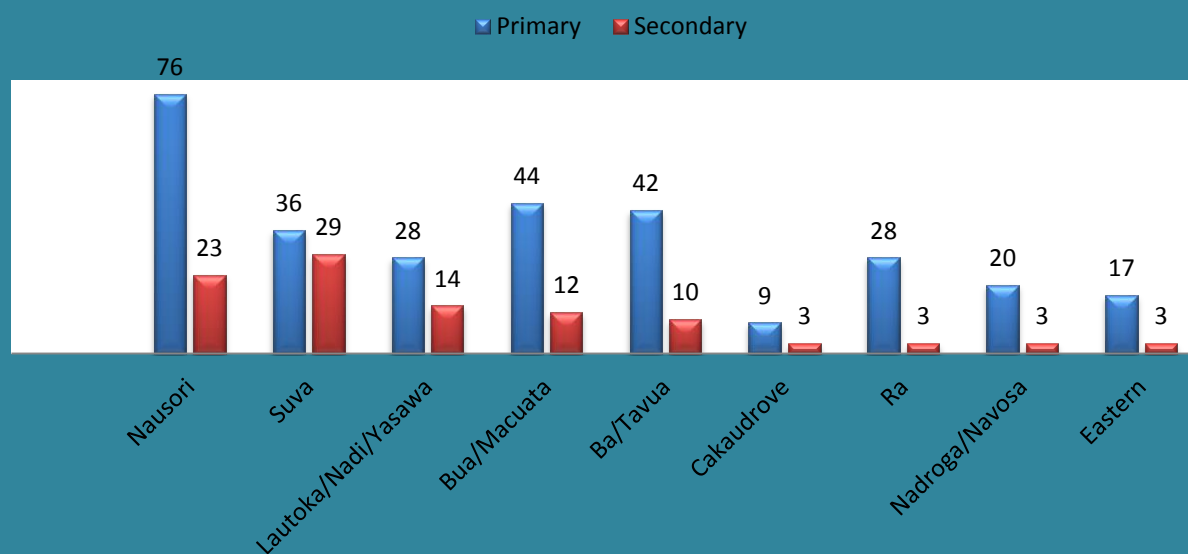

6. SUMMARY REPORTS OF THE IDADAIT ACTIVITIES FROM SCHOOLS AROUND THE COUNTRY

If your answer is YES please provide some details and if your answer is NO please specify the reasons why your school did not take part.

- + Our school organized a no. of activities throughout the week on Drug Awareness such as posters displays, quizzes, model displays, essay writing, oratory contests and healthy food displays. On the 25th June, our school held school based drug awareness program which began with a marching session with teacher, children and well-wishers promoting No Drugs through banners & posters. Some of the activities that the students took part in were character parades, role plays, poems, speeches & songs. We also had a guest speaker Mr Jayanti Lal, retired ASP who addressed the students on the effects of drugs. Children & visitors were also given blue & red ribbons to pin on their collar to embark drug awareness.
- + Our school organized a week long programme. The school theme was - "Say No to Substance abuse, Say YES to Life". Separate themes and activities were set for different days. The official programme was also held on Thursday 25th June on which children talked to students on different topics.
- + World No Drugs Day was organized by the school drug coordinator. There were 3 guest speakers Mr Rohit Sharma (Social Welfare) Mrs Lusiana & Mr Shanal (Police Officers). These people talked about Drugs & Child Abuse. Children took part in the competition such as headband, flag, poem, songs, posters, banners, drug tree & drama. Children were awarded with prizes. All the children & teachers wore red & blue on the 25th June.
- + The Math's/Physic Dept. in collaboration with the Science Dept. organized a week long awareness programme in school to mark the IDADAIT Blue ribbon campaign from the 22nd-25th June. Activities for different levels were organized which included oratory/poster/banner competitions, message tree for teachers. Slogan, & poem recital competitions, character parade, teacher's mufti, door awareness, classroom displays & wearing of red/blue ribbons throughout the week. Students produced very creative and informative work for which they were awarded with prizes during the assembly.
- + We had a whole week programme on the given theme, class based activities, and each level had items to present to the school. Even though the school comes under special education the students put up a good show. Commanding officer of the Toorak Police Post was our chief guest for the Thursday programme with the presence of the parents.
- + The drug awareness program was organized on the 25th June. It was a program organized from 8am -4pm. The school that took part in the programme was Rara District & Naitasiri Sec. School. The schools wore red & blue ribbons to symbolize the IDADAIT. Mrs Nakaiwalu Trisa cut the school cake. The school had guest speakers from St Giles Hospital & Fiji Correctional Services.

- + IDADAIT programme organized in school from 22.06-25.06.15. It was a week long programme where children participated in non-competitive activities like hand-painting, designing of posters, charts & slogans. Red & blue ribbons were worn by the students and teachers and on the day of the celebration children also wore head bands with slogans. a chief guest police officer did the presentation and enhanced the children's knowledge on the effects of drugs whereas the children participated by presenting drama, poems & speech.
- + The school had one week long awareness programme i.e. Mon -tie down drugs. Tues - shade away drugs. Wed -head & arm band. Thurs - school based activity organized for students & parents. Students took part in dramas, speech, and quiz & poster competition. Students that took part were awarded with prizes.
- + Guest speakers were invited to speak on IDADAIT issues. Sgt. Suren Prasad from Ba Police Station accompanied by Detective Hakim, Det. Ronald, Det. Lanyon and WC Miriama came to the College on 25th June and deliberated on drug related offences & issues. All staff & students wore red/blue ribbons throughout the week to spread awareness on IDADAIT issues. Poster displays by each forms, drama by Yr. 12, speeches by student council members & staff based on drug abuse, teenage pregnancy & HIV AIDS, addressing IDADAIT issues during school assembly by the School Principal, display of the banner to raise awareness on IDADAIT.
- + World No Drugs Day was organized by the school drug coordinator. There were 3 guest speakers Mr Rohit Sharma (Social Welfare) Mrs Lusiana & Mr Shanai (Police Officers). These people talked about Drugs & Child Abuse. Children took part in the competition such as headband, flag, poem, songs, posters, banners, drug tree & drama. Children were awarded with prizes. All the children & teachers wore red & blue on the 25th June.
- + The Director Legal services of the Fiji Police Force SSP Sakeo R were our chief guest during IDADAIT opening day. Asst Commissioner Rusiate Tudravu was the chief guest on Thursday 25.06.15, neighboring primary schools joined us in celebration.
- + We did organize a programme for drug awareness in which we had speakers who spoke on different topics in regards to the theme. Mon - Dr. Vilimaina Drugu from Mokani Health Centre. Tues - Sgt Chetty Nausori Police. Weds - Mr Logavatu Leadership skills. Thurs - school based program organized by teachers & students.
- + Our program began with marching from a nearby shop through the 3 villages to the school ground. The chief guests were from Vunidawa Social welfare, Health & Police.
- + During the week at lunch time, poetry competition was done. Also there were poster, book marker & oratory competitions. On Friday there were shortened periods to allow for the summary of the IDADAIT week. The Health officer from the Health Centre nearby was invited to be the Chief Guest, prizes and certificates were presented by the Chief Guest.

Specific reasons why schools did not commemorate IDADAIT:

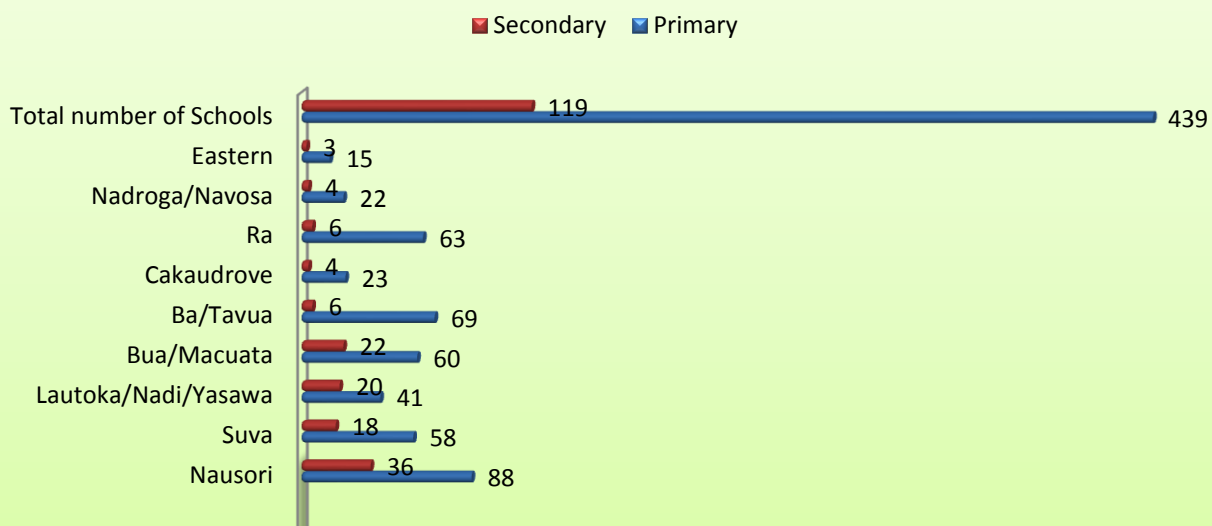
- + The school didn't commemorate IDADAIT because of exams, we will celebrate in 2016.

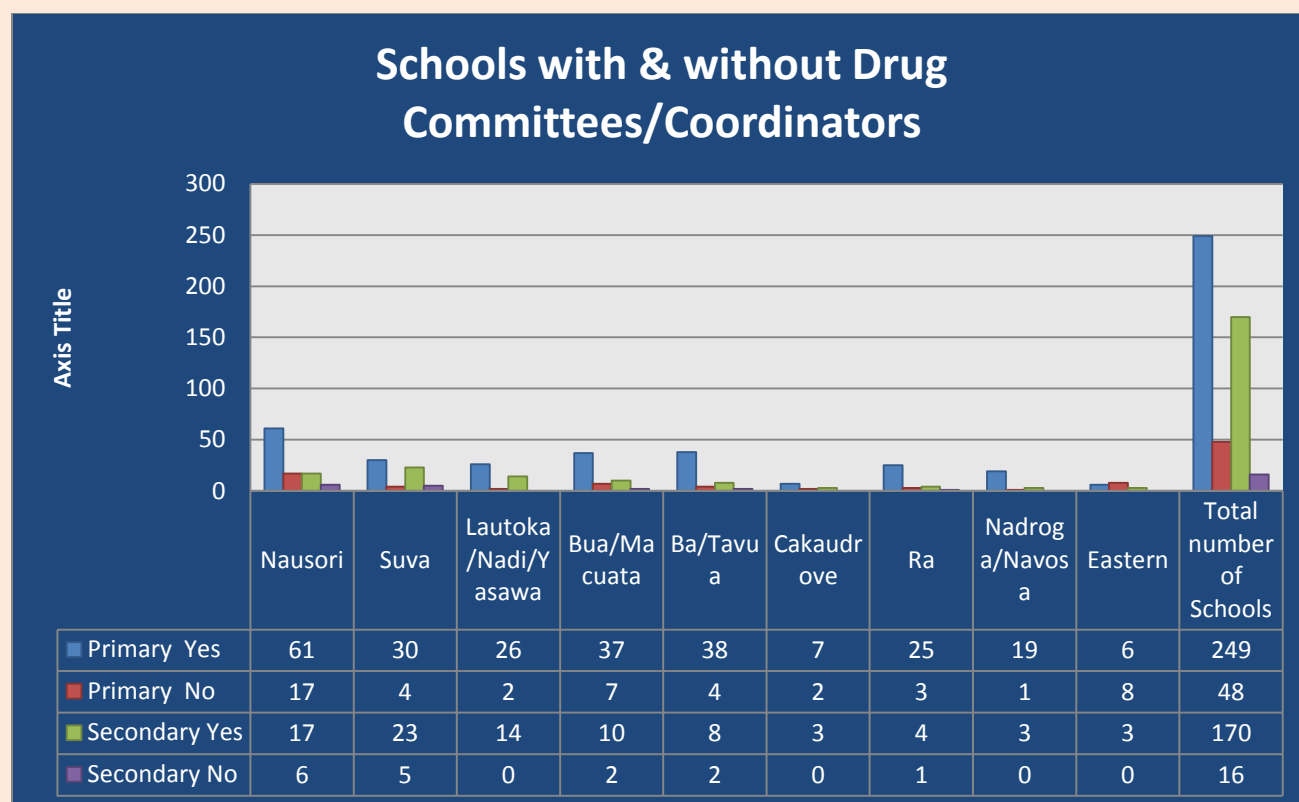
Total number of Drug awareness conducted per Education District

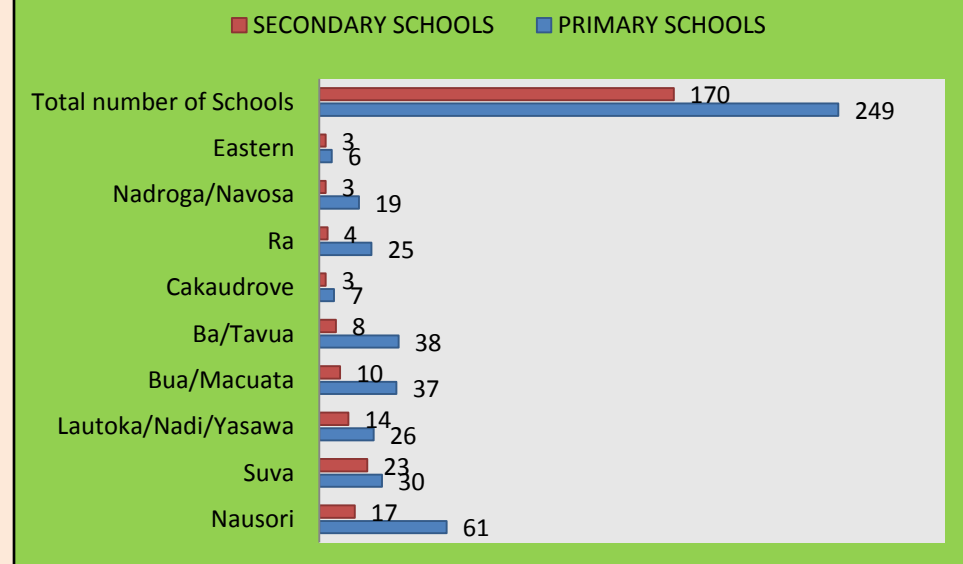

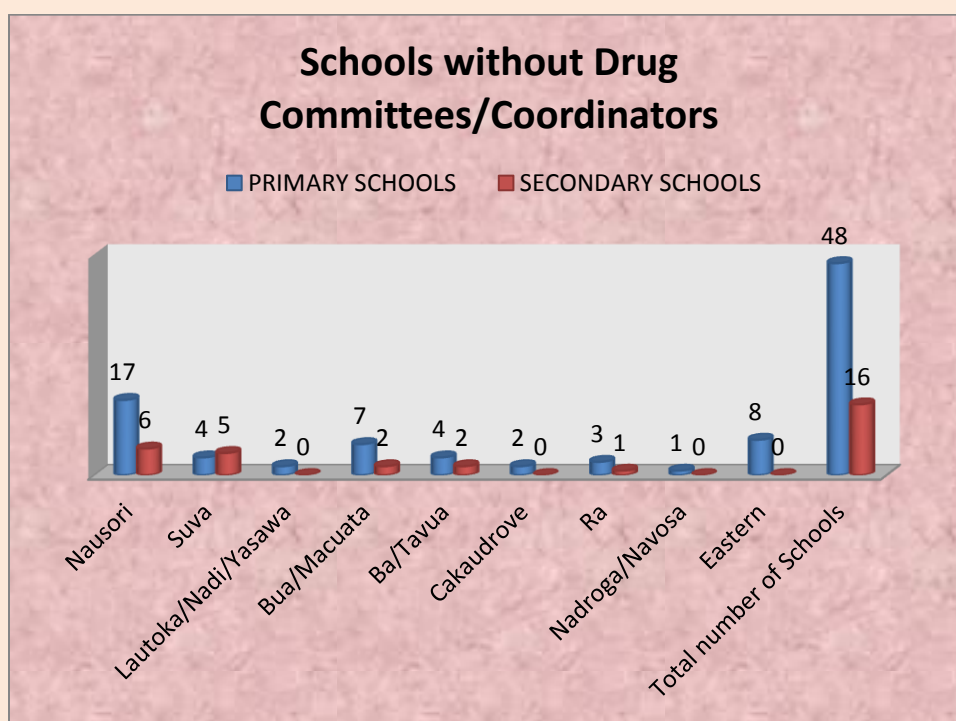
Schools with Drug Coordinators per Education Districts

9. Briefly state some activities that your school has done to address HIV and AIDS, Non-Communicable Diseases and the Prevention of Child Abuse and Elimination of Violence against Girls and Women?

- ❖ Awareness programs have been done in the school on HIV AIDS. The Police also spoke to the school on crime decree & its implications especially on child abuse & violence
- ❖ Inclusion of all these topics in FLE classes. On IDADAIT week NCW addressed violence against women. Visitation by the MOH for checkup for both students & teachers
- ❖ Activities on above relation topics are addressed in school assemblies, Gender meetings , Form times as well as article on above related issues
- ❖ Peer educators in Yrs. 9 &11 have started advocating after undergoing training by NSAAC
- ❖ We have set up culture committee and celebration committee whose tasks is to coordinate school based activities to inspire and empower children to understand their roles and responsibilities in combating the issues noted above. For NCD we set aside Monday for Green day & Friday as fruit day. Teachers are to see that all children's lunch to be inclusive & balanced.
- ❖ Using CAPS meeting as a forum to discuss these issues. We invited speakers from health & police to these CAPS meetings. Gender meetings in school
- ❖ The Health team from Vunisea gave a speech to raise awareness on the above issues when they came for school visit in Term 1. School has zero tolerance to bullying of any kind. Posters are put up on the school notice board outside for children to read.
- ❖ At Vuanicau we have oratory contest every Tuesday on any topic from the 4 categories, child abuse, violence, NCD's & Drugs. Gender meetings also take place once a term on HIVAIDS, Child Abuse &EVAWG.
- ❖ School celebrated IDADAIT with parents, guardians and communities for them to become aware of drugs, violence against girls, boys & women, teen preg and HIV AIDS.
- ❖ Draladamu Primary is greatly indebted to such awareness because the entire school actively participated in the whole week's activity. As it was laid out, the school took the level best advantage of this programme and managed to create awareness not only to the teachers, students & parents but the entire community of Qeledamu

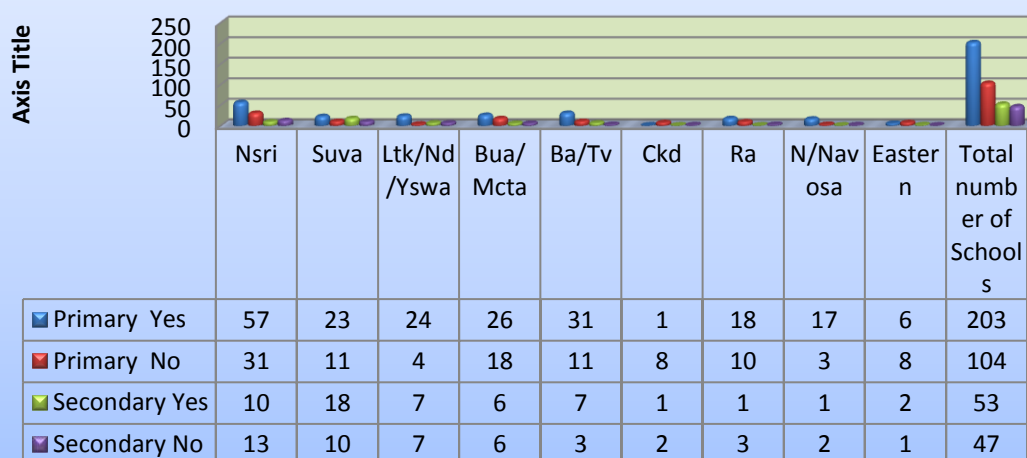
- ❖ We invited professional who had knowledge on these issues i.e. Police/Health. They shared their knowledge to the community first hand.
- ❖ Counseling sessions carried out & FLE classes conducted.
- ❖ Inclusion of these topics in all FLE classes. On IDADAIT wk. the NCW addressed EVAWG. Visitation from the MOH for medical checkup for students & teachers.
- ❖ Newsletters sent to parents. Topic was discussed in CAPS meetings.
- ❖ Classroom awareness, speakers & FLE teachers giving advice to students.
- ❖ Gender meetings to elaborate on the above concerns.
- ❖ Through the use of visual aids i.e. video. Community awareness programmes in the school with the parents.
- ❖ Welfare meetings/Healthy livings & awareness programs
- ❖ All teachers are being role models in terms of being drug free. Drug Free school promoted with signboards. Awareness programs carried out & students marched with slogans & posters/banners.
- ❖ Reminders were given during assemblies or own class time for the children to be aware. The major one was during the IDADAIT week.
- ❖ At Vuanicau we have oratory contest every Tuesday on any topic from the 4 categories, child abuse, violence, NCD's & Drugs. Gender meetings also take place once a term on HIVAIDS, Child Abuse &EVAWG.
- ❖ Educating parents during PTA. Speeches during monthly service in church.
- ❖ We have our Orange Day every 25th of every month and Blue/Red on the last day of every month that is to commemorate the days above. (Nukuloa – Gau)
- ❖ Gender meetings. Prefect's meetings student council. CAPS and visitation to the student's homes. Individual counseling
- ❖ Our school is a HPS school and we have sessions where children are reminded of NCD's. Our HPS Policy does not allow any children to bring junk food in to the school compound. HIV AIDS are mostly discussed with the girls during Gender meetings. A new WAGGGS curriculum will be piloted in a few schools in Fiji and ours will be a pilot school that includes students with disabilities. The VOICES AGAINST VIOLENCE (VAV) curriculum had just started this Term (3). Our approach is to create awareness amongst our girls so that they would try to prevent being victims of violence & abuse.

- During CAPS meeting parents were informed about certain issues pertaining the children but we fail to inform them regarding drug abuse, child abuse and eliminating violence against girls & women.
- The issues were highlighted during our Community Outreach programme.
- CAPS programmes to all the 8 villagers to address more about Child Abuse. Community members, parents and stakeholders were informed about these.
- Awareness was conducted to parents during PTA & CAPS.
- Yes we had conducted awareness to the community and church group.
- During the community & parents meeting in villages
- The school had conducted CAPS meeting to create awareness.
- Mothers Club was formed in Term 3 (2014) to improve access to school and children's welfare. CAPS programme. Islamic gatherings coordinated by the Language teacher.
- CAPS program in villages. **Drug free teachers** and child protection policy. Mrs. Kasa & Head teacher. Tobacco free village celebration - Cuvu village by students/teachers & health officials.
- This was incorporated into the CAPS programme. St John officers had a session with the community & parents
- We had our outreach program to all the 10 villages in the Noco Tikina.
- During PTA - we teachers elaborate the importance of violence against women and child rights, HIV & NCD's. We prepared workshops for PTA's, very interesting.
- During the CAPS meetings and Committee Meetings in school the parents are reminded about the abuse and dangers of drugs and also monitor children at home.
- Village committee appointed to foresee and monitor the abuse of illegal drugs in the village nearby. They closely liaise with the nearby Police post for any incidents pertaining to this.
- Outreach programmes to villages, PTS in school, Womens Fellowship, MYF on violence against girls & women/Drug abuse.

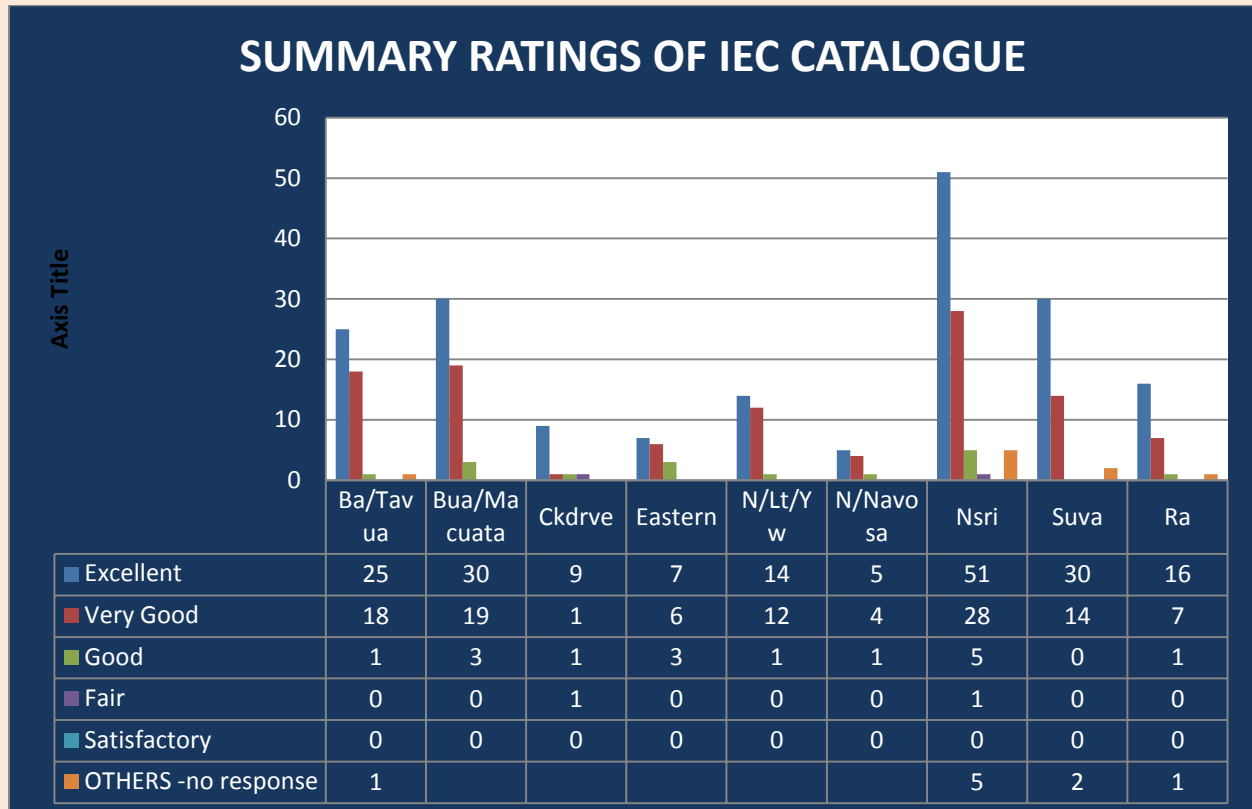
- Part of our community Teachers and Prefects awareness programmes in all villagers surrounding our school
- We had our PTA meetings and this issue was delivered to the parents
- We conducted village outreach to Sauniveiuto, Sadro, Nasavu, Vunibau and other nearby settlements. We covered wide range of topics on the academic side as well as on drugs, NCD's & EVAWG.
- Community awareness was done last year at different venues, i.e. Qauia, Lami & Kalekana.
- The whole school took a walk from the village to show their support that they do not want drugs in their community, during the drug week in 2014
- In 2014 there was an outreach programme for the Malolo community. Apart from student performances, speakers from NSAAC, Social Welfare and the Police were part of this programme.
- The school usually carry out a village visit to the nearby village and advocate on the issues of drugs and sex related activities
- Awareness during outreach CAPS - parents informed about students behaviours.
- Community outreach was done at Lauwaki Village during a youth camp whereby students & teachers created awareness on drug abuse & its effects. Professional Development for staff of STHS on Drugs & Substance abuse.
- The said awareness in question was highlighted during PTI where all parents were unlighted with the current issues.

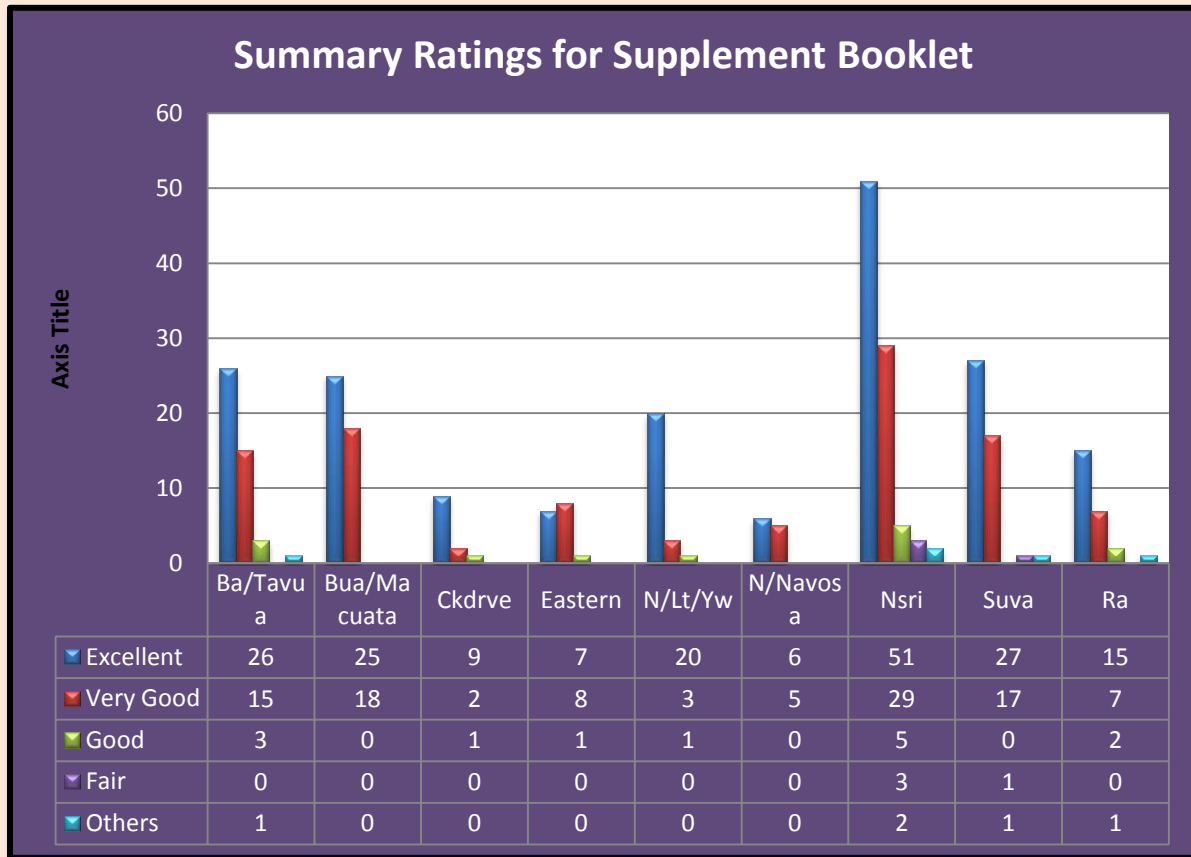

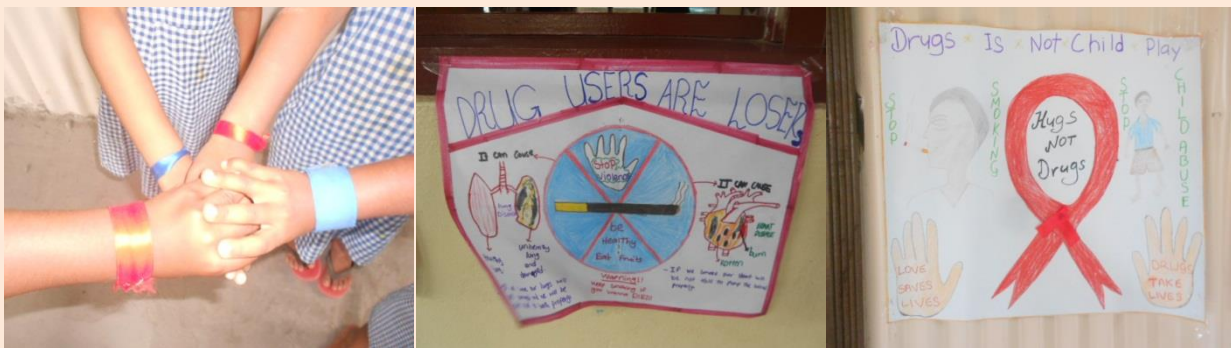

12. How would you rate the Supplement Booklet attached with the circular?



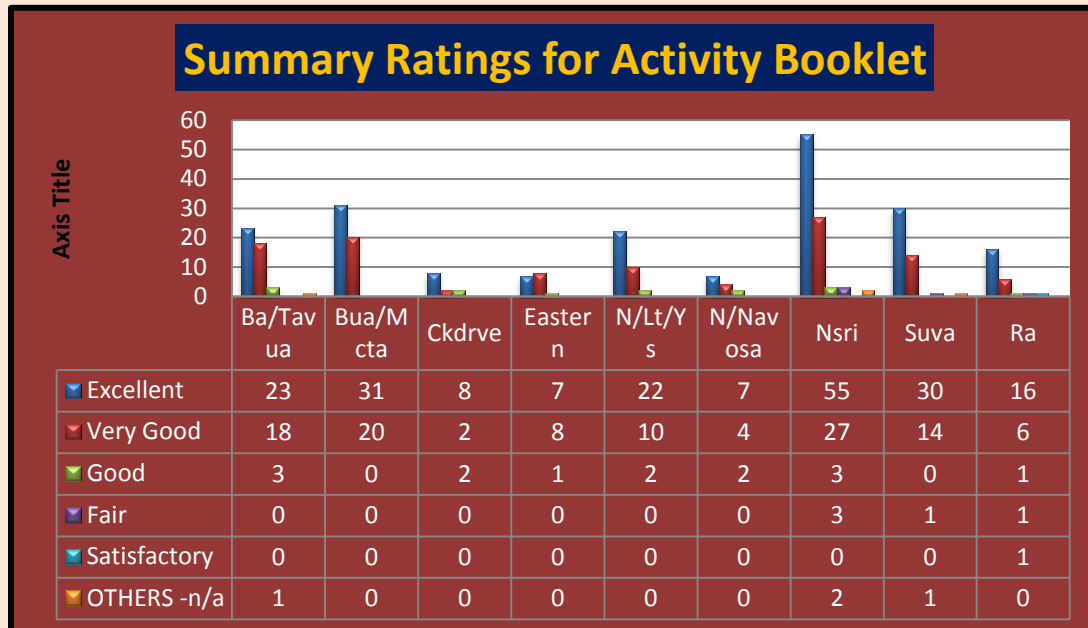

- ✚ We would much appreciate if **more DVD's on drugs could be supplied** together with the booklet since our **school doesn't have access to internet network**. DVD's are the only option for children to see to see & hear what users have to say about drugs. Add on AIDS, Child abuse and EVAWG.
- ✚ The **Kadavu schools** would **badly need financial assistance** to help in the celebrations. For this year's celebration our school coordinated the celebration and we invited the idea for a combined celebration with at least schools from the Kadavu Central cluster comprising of Namalata but only Galoa turned up. We sent our invitation to the Deputy Commissioner of Police Insp. Isikeli Vuniwaqa and an officer from the Drug Unit. They sent a request if we could invite other nearby schools to be present so that we could have a large audience as Kadavu is one of the places known for its cultivation & consumption of marijuana. out of the 15 invitations we sent only 2 schools responses other schools could not since it was too expensive and the schools cannot afford high charges for travelling, transport hire costs \$100-\$120 per school one way, with a school roll of 20+, Kadavu schools need financial assistance and also for **NSAAC to travel to Kadavu to commemorate IDADAIT** with the schools on the Island. IDADAIT celebration will be possible if we have financial assistance.
- ✚ It would be very helpful if **a workshop is conducted** at the **beginning** of the **year** for the **FLE Coordinators**.
- ✚ **Island schools to be supplied with IEC materials**
- ✚ If possible **police officers to be delegated to schools** so students are well informed, data's, statistics to be provided.
- ✚ If the **package containing the booklets for drugs awareness week** could **be sent earlier** especially to **remote schools**.
- ✚ We **recommend that small red/blue ribbons** like the ones for HIV AIDS to be distributed to the public so we can wear it on a daily basis. **(The fight is every day)**
- ✚ If we can have DVD's showing results of abuse, emotional, neglect documentaries. Train some teachers to be NSAAC volunteers. If it could be taught in schools as part of co-curricular activities to keep reminding children.
- ✚ If IEC materials on drugs can be supplied to schools and **NSAAC arrange for the police to visit schools** during **IDADAIT**. If **MOE & NSAAC can make it a regulation that all schools be Drug Free**.
- ✚ The community at large to be involved in the campaign instead of just organizing school based programme so that the children & elders are aware of drugs. Schools to reach out & educate the community.

CONCLUSION

It was clear from the reports received that students and teachers alike were delighted with the activities and overall celebration of the IDADAIT 2015. This year NSAAC created a new theme for the next three years much to the delight of the schools - based on responses received as it reflected the emphasis not only Drugs but other topics a holistic theme **-OUR HEALTH, OUR LIFE, OUR RESPONSIBILITY.** I Taukei version: **NA TIKO BULABULA E NODA ITAVI** Hindi version: **HAMARA SWASTH, HAMARA JIWAN, HAMARI JIMEDAREE.**

A good number of schools have even taken the extra initiative of sharing their knowledge of Drugs, Substance Abuse, HIV & AIDS, Child Abuse, Violence against Girls and Women to the Communities and these schools and teachers must be commended.

In addition while the initiatives of the schools must be commended for the celebration of the IDADAIT, there needs to be improvement in the responses and collating of the Evaluation Forms from schools. For the schools in the Central Division precisely within the Suva and Nausori corridor NSAAC had to travel to the schools to pick the forms in November after numerous reminders were forwarded to the schools for the submissions of IDADAIT Evaluation Forms 2015, as compared to schools as far as Lau, Kadavu, the North and Western division that sent in their Evaluation Forms and Reports earlier.

While it was a great challenge for the limited staff of NSAAC to implement the various roles and functions of the National Substance Abuse Advisory Council as stated in the Substance Abuse Act of 1998, we are confident that in 2016 the IDADAIT programme will be more efficient and more responses and initiatives would be undertaken by schools.

The Senior volunteers were a great asset to the success of the 2015 IDADAIT as they managed to visit schools that the NSAAC staff could not visit in previous years since the inception of IDADAIT IN 2008, Education Districts like Bua/Macuata, Cakaudrove in the Northern Division and even some interior schools in the Nausori Education District in the Province of Naitasiri, Tailevu, etc.

With the IDADAIT now into its eighth year, it is clearly evident that schools look forward to the IDADAIT in Week 7 of Term 2 as all schools have their own school programmes that support the NSAAC annual core activity through the submission of Reports and pictures submitted to the office.
